California

Britton Konyenburg Partners, Modesto

The Britton and Van Konyenburg families have farmed in the San Joaquin Valley for four generations. They are experienced growers of almonds, apples, apricots, cherries, grapes, peaches, and walnuts.

Vincent B. Zaninovich & Sons, Delano

Ryan Zaninovich

This is one of California's top table grape growing organizations. This past spring Ryan was re-elected chairman of the California Grape & Tree Fruit League. The state's table grape growers moved more than 100 million boxes of grapes for the first time last year and at higher f.o.b. levels.

Alkali Hollow Farms, Madera

Larry Lowder

Lowder is part of a large family operation (Andrew Farms) which grows winegrapes, almonds, and pistachios. He has been secretary/treasurer of American Pistachio Growers for the past four years.

Jackson Farms, Kingsburg

Jackson Farms is a third-generation farming operation located in the heart of the San Joaquin Valley. They

have been Certified Organic since 2009 and have been at the forefront of Integrated Pest Management technologies since the early 1990s. They grow and harvest cherries and peaches and are always looking for "outside the box" alternatives to farm management.

Carriere Family Farms and Borges of California, Glenn

Bill Carrier

Carriere is the president of Carriere Family Farms, a partnership between Bill and four cousins, all of whom are fourth-generation California farmers. Bill and his family harvest 1,500 acres of walnuts. They also custom harvest walnuts for their neighbors, operate two walnut hulling and drying facilities, have an in-shell packing plant and, most recently, have added a walnut shelling plant. Carriere is a graduate of the California Ag Leadership Program.

TOS Farms, Hanford

William L. Tos, Jr.

Tos is a third-generation Northern California family farmer, co-owner of Tos Farms, Inc., and a partner with the Tos Farming Company. He has served on the California Walnut Commission and California Walnut Board in the capacity as member and alternate and is currently the Vice-Chairperson of the California Walnut Commission. Additionally, he has served as a director on the Diamond Walnut Growers Board, the Kings County Farm Bureau, and the California Tree Fruit Agreement Research Committee. Currently he is

Cummings-Violich, Chico

Dan Cummings

Cummings is a partner in Cummings & Violich, which farms more than 7,000 acres of nuts — mostly almonds. Dan, who has an MBA from Harvard, is also a beekeeper, and provides invaluable depth of knowledge to the Almond Board of California. More than any other crop, almonds are inextricably tied with honeybees, so it makes sense that Dan serves as chairman of the ABC's Pollination Committee. Dan also helped found Project Apis, which is dedicated to enhancing the health of America's honeybees.

Goehring Vineyards, Clements

Brad Goehring

Goehring's company plants 5% to 10% of California's new winegrape acreage each year. That adds up to about 23,000 acres through the years in 11 counties. Goehring is extremely active in the industry, serving as chairman of the California Association of Winegrape Growers' No-Pay Task Force, which goes after deadbeat wineries. He was successful in getting new legislation passed that helps winegrape growers collect from vintners who reneged on grape contracts.
